





An orange Hermit Crab is prying on a small Whelk shell, ivory with brown stripes. He might have chosen a yellow-pink Moon Snail shell instead.




The Measled Cowrie shell has brown spots on a yellowish background. The smaller ones, beside the purple Sea Rods, may be grayish or yellow.




The Crown Melonga is a shell with smooth white spines and brown striping. Sharp spines are on both sides of the brown Surgeon-fish's bluish tail.




The ridges and gray and lavender stripes on the pinkish Sunray Venus shells are a pastel gingham pattern. The little Beach Mouse has a buff back with snow-white underparts.




Pale gold Jingle shells fasten themselves to a rock near the Redbeard Sponges. The greenish Trunkfish swims over them.




Blue-black Mussels have spun fine threads to bind themselves to the piling. The Barnacles are cream and the Sea Anemone brown with yellowish tentacles.



The Fighting Conch can move so fast it seems to jump. Its shell is orange, shading to ivory at the pointed end. The Yellowtail's body is light blue. Its stripe, fins and tail are yellow.




The black-billed, brown-headed Oyster-catcher's bill is a tool for opening Oyster and Mussel shells scattered over the beach.




The shells shaped like butterflies in the collection are Coquinas. They are yellow, pink, lavender or white.




Scattered among the shells and sand, the Piping Plover's eggs are hard to find. She is almost the color of sand and is difficult to see when she is not moving.




Blue Angelfish have outer edges of yellow with inner bands of brown on their fins and tails. The tulip shell is orange.




The Amber Pen shell can be almost a foot long. These have been washed to the base of a growing Sponge.




Silvery, black-stiped Sergeant-majors flicker past delicate yellow Sunrise Tellin shells, touched with rays of lavender. Nearby is a green alga, named Merman's Shaving Brush.



The Florida Horse Conch shell sometimes grows to be two feet long. Make it yellowish-brown with red banding. The knobbed and fluted scallop-shaped shell is a Lion's Paw.




Arks are all heavy shells with comb-like teeth on their hinges. The Turkey Wings have brown wavy lines and are brown or violet inside.




A Purple Starfish lies on a ledge near a colony of Periwinkles, which can be black, brown, yellowish or reddish. They cling to the rock and feed on seaweed.



The Fig is a light brown shell with a darker inside. The Green Parrotfish has four teeth that he uses for grinding up coral.



The paddle-shaped claws of the olive-green Crab help him swim. Scallops shoot out water between their shell edges to jet ahead.



Pearl gray Least Terns fly over the rose-lined Cockle shells and greenish Razor Clam shells lying on the beach.
